5th Grade



We are analyzing mentor text by comparing it to the 6 traits narrative writing rubric. One of the most exciting lessons we have completed is about point of view and perspective. We will use this understanding and combine it with our knowledge of Native American tribes to create narratives from the Native American point of view.

In math, we continue to build on our understanding of multi-digit multiplication. Please try to work on mastery of the basic multiplication facts up to the 12 times table. This is an essential skill and will be used in many future applications.

Drop off Time: 8:45 AM; School begins: 9:00 am Please do not bring students to school prior to 8:45 am.



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Please Read This Important Information?

Recently, Dr. Rickansrud and I talked with students about respect and bullying-prevention. In kindergarten and first grades we read and discussed books about using kind words, cooperating and playing fairly. Grades 2 through 5 learned about the anti-bullying law and procedures. All students were taught how they can be "Upstanders" (helpful bystanders) when they encounter mean-spirited behavior and about the difference between conflict and bullying.

I recommend that students and staff members describe people's words and actions and I am asking parents and guardians to do this as well. Describing is much more effective than labeling. For example, it is more helpful to say, "Winston is cutting in front of me" then, "Winston is mean." It is better to tell someone that "Harriet didn't ask me to play soccer," than to declare that "Harriet is a bully."

If your child tells you that a classmate pushed him, ask what was going on before that happened. In most cases, there was an argument or negative words were exchanged. Here's a typical situation: During recess, Nigel wanted Sherlock to pass him the ball. Nigel said, "What's wrong with you? Didn't you see that I was open?" Sherlock responded, "I passed it to Mariana who was open too." An argument takes place and Nigel pushes Sherlock and then Sherlock pushes him back. Your child Nigel only tells you that Sherlock pushed him. If you get upset, you might call the school and say that your child was pushed and you want something done about it. If you ask questions, you may discover that your child was involved in a playground conflict and that he was a big part of the problem.

If you insist that your child is being "bullied", the principal would tell the "anti-bullying specialist" to begin an investigation that includes talking to the involved students and possible witnesses, getting written statements, completing a lengthy report, and forwarding it to the district anti-bullying specialist. Then the superintendent and Board of Education determine if "HIB" (harassment, intimidation or bullying) occurred. A letter would be sent to you and a copy placed in your child's permanent file and in the file of the student you accused of bullying, regardless of the outcome of the investigation. This is New Jersey state law.

Conflict is a part of life and we want students to learn healthy ways to work through it. Bullying is one-sided, purposeful, cruel and usually ongoing behavior that can cause serious harm to the target. We take bullying very seriously at Thomas Paine and will follow through with the above procedures. However, if the counselor and principal spend several days investigating a situation that turns out to be conflict, this takes away from class time for some students and pro-active services for all. This is just one reason why it is important that we choose our words carefully and describe what's happening rather than immediately labeling it.

If you have concerns about any situation at school, please contact me. I am here to help our students learn how to handle the challenges and conflicts of everyday life. Working together, we can continue to make Thomas Paine Elementary School a place where everyone lives our core values of respect, responsibility, resiliency and active citizenship.
